Richard F. Mollica, MD, is the author of "Healing Invisible Wounds: Paths to Hope and Recovery in a Violent World." A Harvard Medical School Professor of Psychiatry and director of the Harvard Program in Refugee Trauma, Dr. Mollica holds an MAR from Yale Divinity School and is a Fulbright New Century Scholar. He is the recipient of many honors and awards, including the American Psychiatric Association's Human Rights Award.



## **Adapting to a Changing World: Promising Practices In The Acculturation Process**

Dr. Richard F. Mollica will discuss promising practices in the field of refugee mental health and how that relates to successful acculturation. He will discuss practices that have been implemented in successful resettlement and integration programs. Dr. Mollica is a Professor of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School and Director of the Harvard Program in Refugee Trauma (HPRT) at Massachusetts General Hospital. Dr. Mollica co-founded the Indochinese Psychiatry Clinic (IPC), one of the first clinical programs for refugees in the United States. Over the past two decades, IPC and later, HPRT, pioneered the medical and mental health care of survivors of mass violence and torture in the U.S. and abroad. Under Dr. Mollica's direction, HPRT conducts clinical, training, policy, and research activities for populations affected by mass violence around the world.
